MCT partners with Toronto Police for DISS remount

Mixed Company Theatre is proud to announce a new partnership with the Toronto Police Services Board to bring DISS—MCT's groundbreaking gang violence production—to schools throughout the Toronto area this spring. Thanks to generous funding, 25 priority schools will have the opportunity to participate in this interactive performance in May—June 2011.

Originally created in 2009, in collaboration with professional artists including Chalmers Awardwinning playwright, Rex Deverell, hip-hop artists Tru-Paz and Miles Jones, and Toronto area youth affected by violence in their communities, DISS has played to over 5,000 Toronto high school students and has been recognized by the Toronto Police Service as an effective tool to engage and educate youth on this current and hot-button issue.

A new component for this tour will be the addition of post-show discussion after the performances facilitated by Toronto Police and members of community organizations that focus on gang and violence-related issues with Toronto area youth. This new component will help solidify the message and act as forum for youth to further discuss the issues with members of their own community who have front-line experience with and understanding of violence.

DISS employs Mixed Company Theatre's unique forum theatre technique, with youth performing raps based on their experience with violence while a DJ spins live beats throughout the show. The play presents worst-case scenarios of gang involvement, catalyzing audience members to express their voices, making our communities safer.

Our offices are buzzing with enthusiastic activity thanks in part to tour and operating grant funding MCT has received for our 2010/2011 initiatives. Support from the Toronto Arts Council (TAC), the City of Toronto Drug Prevention Community Intervention Program, and the Ontario Arts Council (OAC) are helping move forward our mandate to engage, educate and empower. We're excited about sharing details of this news with you and extend our gratitude to these benefactors.

MCT's Community Initiative for 2010/11 -The Compass Project - is made possible thanks to the generosity of the City of Toronto's Drug Prevention Community Intervention Program. MCT artists will collaborate with youth aged 16-25 who have experienced substance use to develop an original, interactive, and issue-based play. Working with the Canadian Safe Schools Network (formerly Empowered Student Partnerships), this dynamic team of 8 Compass participants will perform for 10 youth audiences in priority neighbourhoods across Toronto. The Compass Project will provide opportunities for youth to develop communication skills, for positive community interaction and personal growth, while empowering approximately 200 marginalized youth from diverse backgrounds to find solutions to substance abuse issues.

The OAC's Touring Grant helps artists and organizations reach and develop new audiences, fostering collaboration between touring companies and local artists, organizations and communities. For MCT, this assisted our efforts to expand the geographic boundaries of the Fall 2010 Educational tour.

Mixed Company is also happy to announce that through the Government of Ontario, Ministry of Tourism and Culture, we have received additional funds to support organizational sustainability from the Arts Investment Fund. Administered by OAC, Executive Director John Brotman stated that this fund aims, "to build private sector support, grow earned revenues and invest in audience development." Ongoing operating support has also been received from both the OAC and the TAC.

We're always grateful for the tour and operating grant funding bestowed upon us and look forward to this year being MCT's best ever!

On the Road Again with Project ACT

In the wake of rave reviews from its' Spring pilot - Project ACT - this three-tiered, interactive, entertaining, and age-appropriate approach to empowering students, sponsored by Ontario's Ministry of Health Promotion & Sport, kicked off its full, 100 performance, province-wide tour at the end of September in Thunder Bay.

Touring Ontario's four corners Fall 2010 was both exhausting and exhilarating for MCT's outstanding cast; performing to audiences - North, East, West, and South, culminated in the fall season finale on December 16th at Markham's Little Rouge PS with honoured guests from the York school board, York Public Health, and the Minister of Health Promotion and Sport - The Honourable Margarett Best.

Project ACT's Winter 2011 Season Debut was held at Windsor's Catholic Central H.S., where school board officials, local teachers, and CBC Windsor amazed at the power of the performance in engaging students to recognize and overcome the barriers that prevent them from leading active, healthy lives - forum theatre at its best! Overwhelmed by Windsor schools' enthusiasm, MCT has been invited to return to the area February 22nd/ 23rd. Project ACT performances are planned through until March 11th to schools in Hamilton, Durham and Toronto.





A Fine Line Connects in Rep with Project ACT

MCT's new production: A Fine Line- a new play about harassment - explores how teens negotiate their sexuality in a society that is hypersexualized. Created in collaboration with youth, A Fine Line presents an exacting portrayal of dialogue, language, and conduct in an effort to accurately depict and reach youth Also new is Mixed Company's touring methodology for A Fine Line and Project ACT this winter. The two are touring in repertoire - that is to say, the actors in the company perform both plays while on tour.

This pairing and methodology though new for MCT has proven to be a successful combination. Advanced bookings for both performances are reportedly stronger than any advance ticket sales in MCT history!

PROJECT FACTS

- Developed in collaboration with youth and Community Partners including national health organizations from across the province, this interactive presentation empowers young people to incorporate the Foundations for a Healthy School into their lives and their communities.
- Focusing on target areas of Physical Activity, Healthy Eating, and Substance Abuse Prevention, students are helped to recognize and overcome blocks, excuses, barriers and deflections
- Educators know that learning is enhanced and behaviours changed when the learning environment encourages participation. This practice of learning by doing underpins all of Mixed Company Theatre's productions and is especially true of Project ACT's three-tiered approach.
- In Tier One, The Play and The Interactive Forum experience invite audiences to become "spect-actors."
- In **Tier Two**, The Post Show Discussion, local health and wellness facilitator partners join MCT's touring company to facilitate small group, conversation with students and educators. Through this, safe and encouraging environment, the interactive forum is extended with a myriad of issues and excuses brought forward for closer examination and discussion. This forum works to activate and deepen student knowledge and understanding on the importance of formulating positive situational choices, connected to life-long outcomes. .
- While Tiers One and Two are powerful components to the success of Project ACT, it is the inclusion of Tier Three - Activating Student Learning - that ensures lasting positive outcomes for youth audiences. Long after the company and local facilitators leave, the Teacher Resource tool kit and guide remain with educators and students to continue building on the learning and changes activated by Tier One and Two experiences. Created by teachers for teachers, the guide includes a series of modules with pre and post performance activities and lesson plans packaged alongside a host of resources and contacts. all working in unison to help students take ACTion in bringing healthy programs to their school community.

MIXED MESSAGES Delivers a CLEAR MESSAGE

Closing its third season tour at the end of September 2010, the *Mixed Messages* cast reflected on the power it continues to deliver to young audiences about acquaintance rape (also known as date rape): the clear and simple message that: "No means No!"

Duncan McCallum, MM's tour director summarizes: The production this year has captured the confusion and uncertainty which occurs during the first moments of attraction. When youth enter into University and College there is so much freedom and exuberance that their boundaries and choices become cloudy. As individuals, we allow others to convince us into activities we don't really feel sure about. When drugs and alcohol become involved, youth can be in danger of over stepping boundaries and going to places one's sober self does not want to be, which can lead to a multitude of worst case scenarios. Mixed Messages helps to shine a light on these moments during the beginning of post secondary life, and helps to enlighten and empower the youth about being aware and conscious of their choices.

Aimed at educating and engaging students on the issues connected to acquaintance rape, Mixed Messages portrays events and decisions that lead to a situation of acquaintance rape, as well as the aftermath of the event from the perspective of the victim, the perpetrator and a bystander.

MIXED MESSAGES addresses the sensitive issues surrounding acquaintance rape; by offering students the opportunity to consider the impact on all of the characters in the play, and in its interactive forum half, the "spect-actors" propose alternative courses of action.

Ryerson University and University of Toronto student feedback is clear that Mixed Messages delivers a powerful and clear message

"As a counselor who has for years worked

both with survivors and perpetrators of

sexual assault, as well as with drug and

alcohol issues, I thought that the original script was very realistic, yet not simplistic, and that the actors were real with their possible errs in judgment and behaviour. The storyline and the dialogue created scenarios in which one could easily imagine oneself in the same situations or saying the same things. The forum format provided students with the opportunity to recreate each scene, allowing them to practice their assertive and communication skills and/or to better appreciate just how difficult these situations can in fact be, inebriated or not. I have seen numerous forum productions over the years and while all of the components of the performance are important, it is the facilitation that has always struck me as the most critical. With this show, it was the approach of the facilitator, Duncan McCallum, who made all the components of the production come together. This format only works as well as the audience feels safe and supported to express their views and to play out their perspectives. With his stellar cast, Duncan finds the perfect balance in creating this safe environment, doing this both in the nonjudgmental manner in which he approaches each person and situation, but also in the way in which he educates on some points (e.g., re responsibility if having sex with someone who is drunk) and the easy way he is also quick to address any inappropriate comments or behaviours from the audience. Moreover, he seemed so comfortable in his role that I was left feeling that he had no idea just how good he is at what he does - a charming attribute in any leader. I would highly recommend this performance to any educational institution (i.e., high

Dating Violence Themes Playing to High School Venues 2011/2012

- 2011 SPRING TOUR SEASON MCT's Artistic Director, Simon Malbagot will be directing Sheatre's FAR FROM THE HEART, touring Toronto and Saskatchewan tours in Spring & Fall 2011. FAR FROM THE HEART is a production spotlighting dating violence, rape, sexual assault, and teaching teens about safe relationships. Far From the Heart— developed in collaboration with a group of teens under professional direction— aims to help youth recognize the different forms of pressure and violence in dating relationships, and explores the issues that lie beneath this behaviour. This interactive forum theatre play presents problematic scenarios that end in a dilemma to deliberately stimulate audience members into action. Interactive forum theatre techniques utilizing improvisation are employed immediately, inviting students to solve the problems.
- MCT ADDS MIXED MESSAGES TO THE 2011/2012 SECONDARY SCHOOL EDUCATIONAL TOUR LINE UP.
 Teacher feedback indicates that there is a need for this performance for Secondary School students; to that end, work is underway to adapt the performance for high schools for the 2011/2012 MCT Educational Tour season.



Winter 2011 and it's cold outside but MCT is feeling the warmth of support and our partnership with The City of Toronto as we commence planning for the 20th consecutive year of MCT's Community Initiative Project, engaging at-risk youth.

Dubbed "The Compass Project" this year's focus - drug misuse and abuse - is garnering interest as youth sign up for auditions in early February. Over a four week period, 8 young people between the ages of 15-25 will be given the opportunity to work on an original, interactive, and issue-based play. Rooming with Toronto Community Housing: MCT Creates Legislative Theatre with tenants, administration

2010 saw Mixed Company Theatre forge a strong partnership with Toronto Community Housing Corporation (TCHC). Creating the enormously successful Up For Eviction, which explored the issue of tenant eviction with TCHC staff, encouraged the housing corporation to continue working on further projects, like the Home Sweet Home. Using common children's games combined with theatre games and techniques over a period of several weeks, MCT's was able to help tenants, staff and administration from Toronto Community Housing create a Legislative Theatre play to help develop a new Charter of Rights for tenants and staff. Participants in the project, who originally defined each other as adversaries within TCHC in the past, were able to bind together through theatre to find their common goal, discovering that they were all part of the same community—and that theatre could help them find answers to the problems ailing their community.

How to Cook A Community Theatre Project for Legislative Theatre

Ingredients:

- 2 dozen Toronto Community Housing (TCHC) tenants, staff, and administrators
- ½ dozen Interviews and Workshops with Focus Groups
- 2 Additional Sessions peeled.
- 4 Weeks of Theatre Training, Exercises, Children's games
- 2 weeks of Rehearsals
- 1 Facilitator or more as needed
- 1 Design Team
- Laughter (to taste)
- Patience and Energy

Directions/Method:

- In a large room, take several dozen Toronto Community Housing (TCHC) tenants, staff, and administrators who see themselves as adversaries to one another
- 2. Combine with half a dozen interviews and workshops with focus groups to glean the critical issues and resources
- 3. Peel two audition sessions to determine creative and performance teams
- 4. Blend in four weeks of theatre training,
- exercises, and children's games to bond a group. Simmer until a script is developed. 5.
- 6. Add two weeks of rehearsals.
- 7. 8. Stir in facilitation and design teams.
- Add laughter to taste.
- Garnish with patience and energy.
- 10. Serve the performance to a willing and eager
